## Toolbox Talk -A Script for Poster 10

On a dangerous goods package there are labels and marks. The labels are the diamond shaped, coloured and with images representing the hazards of the dangerous goods that are contained within the package.

The labels represent all of the dangerous goods hazardous classes. There are 9 classes.



Each one represents a distinct hazard group, Explosives, Gases, etc

The labels in the photograph on the poster depict what type of hazards? Ans: Organic Peroxide and Corrosives.

You might have an idea how dangerous corrosives are - the pictures on the label provide a clue but the other one? The image shows fire and the colours indicate flammability but also that it's an oxidiser. This means this products has the potential to burn fiercely. A product that burns through metal and skin and burns fiercely is certainly worthy of the title dangerous goods.

It's important that you know what the 9 classes are and what the labels represent those classes and their sub-divisions. 
